MOMENTUM AND COLLISIONS

MOMENTUM IS THE PRODUCT OF AN OBJECT'S MASS AND ITS VELOCITY, MATHEMATICALLY EXPRESSED AS $p = mv$. IT IS A VECTOR QUANTITY, WHICH MEANS IT HAS BOTH MAGNITUDE AND DIRECTION. TYPES OF COLLISIONS

COLLISIONS CAN BE CATEGORIZED AS ELASTIC OR INELASTIC. IN ELASTIC COLLISIONS, BOTH MOMENTUM AND KINETIC ENERGY ARE CONSERVED, WHILE IN INELASTIC COLLISIONS, MOMENTUM IS CONSERVED, BUT KINETIC ENERGY IS NOT. THIS DISTINCTION IS VITAL FOR ANALYZING REAL-WORLD INTERACTIONS, SUCH AS CAR CRASHES OR SPORTS IMPACTS.

- ELASTIC COLLISIONS: KINETIC ENERGY IS CONSERVED.
- INELASTIC COLLISIONS: KINETIC ENERGY IS NOT CONSERVED, BUT MOMENTUM IS.
- PERFECTLY INELASTIC COLLISIONS: THE OBJECTS STICK TOGETHER POST-COLLISION.

ROTATIONAL DYNAMICS
