His commandment permits man to live as man before God, in a world God made, with responsibility for the institutions of that world.

During that time when most people understandably struggled to protect their own lives, as well as the lives of those they loved, he often ventured by faith into uncertain territory, risking his reputation and life to advocate for others. 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introduces the hermeneutic quality of Bonhoeffer's theology as a further important feature of his Christian humanism.
