He looks at key developments that have had an impact on foreign policy and the emergence of what he calls universal history, which brings far-flung peoples into regular contact for the first time. In a final section, Praxeology, Aron articulates a normative theory of international relations that rejects both the bleak vision of the Machiavellians, who hold that any means are legitimate, and the naivete of the idealists, who think foreign policy can be overcome. This new edition of *Peace and War* includes an informative introduction by Daniel J. Mahoney and Brian C. Anderson, situating Aron's thought in a new post-Cold War context, and evaluating his contribution to the study of politics and international relations.
